


Reading

EYFS: This week we are looking at the story; What the Lady Bird Heard. We are focusing on; the characters, setting, problem and solution. So far, we have retrieved words the author used to describe the farm animals. Next, we will pull the book apart discussing what happens at the beginning, middle and end of the story and then make our own predictions as to what will happen next. Last week the children found exciting ways to connect their play to their learning and worked hard to apply new vocabulary e.g., carnivore, omnivore, herbivore and nocturnal to their play experiences.




Year 1: In Reading we are looking at 'There's a Rang-Tan in My Bedroom". We have looked at summarising on Tuesday and Wednesday and then on Friday we will be looking at retrieval. Mrs Steward and Mrs Downes are proud of the children's retrieval skills when they were looking at the poem Chocolate Cake by Michael Rosen.

Year 2: We are looking at the book - Great Women who Changed the World. We are also looking at inference skills and personal response to a text. Mrs Payne is proud of how the children are getting used to different parts of the lesson, and how their inference skills are improving. Miss Atherton is proud of the children for challenging themselves more in reading to expand on their answers and complete the challenges.



Year 3: On Wednesday we finished 'Operation Gadgetman' and have now started our new text 'The Dancing Bear'! The last few lessons have been specifically on interpreting information © One thing Mr Jones was proud of was battling through difficult vocabulary and making sense of it by reading the words around it!

Year 4: Last week, we focused on retrieval and started our new text Varjak Paw. The children are really enjoying the text and are showing a good understanding of what we have read. We started off the week by creating a story map and family tree for Chapter 1. The children really enjoyed this and were able to convey the story through pictures.



Year 5: We are currently reading The Explorer. We Have been Focusing on contrasting text types for inference, this includes the core text and a narrative extract. This week is a big focus on inference. I am proud of all the hard work they have been putting into their reading test questions.



Year 6: This week in Reading, we have been looking at test practise. We are looking at different texts and answering different questions in preparation for the SATs next week. We have been really focusing on find and copy and summarising and sequencing events in order. We have also been reading The Island, which we will continue after SATs. Miss Lister is proud of how well the children have been doing with answering 2 or 3 mark questions where they have had to use evidence to back up. They have been using the phrase 'because in the text it says' to help them. Miss Jenkins is really proud of the children for focusing on skimming and scanning and make sure we are precise with our answers.



Rainbow: We've been reading Aesop's fable The Sun and The Wind and linked extracts about planets and space which the children have enjoyed. We've focused on retrieval and how to scan for key words/ info. They've done really well with this skill alongside increased fluency. They're really flying with this and their sounds write application to read new words.

Year 4 Curiosity Cube Visit!

Pupils in Year 4 had a fabulous time exploring the Curiosity Cube when it visited Samuel Ward Academy this week! It was a great opportunity to enjoy some real hands-on science investigations!









History

History continues to an important part of the school's curriculum offer all the way from EYFS through to Year 6. We are currently living through a significant period of British History, with the Kings Coronation this weekend highlighted how important it is for children to be aware of their past and also the modern history they are living through.

In KS1, children have continued learning about the historical importance of their locality as well as the influence that famous Historians have had on us, and how we understand the world around us today.

Year 3 continue to learn about the Ancient Egyptians and are now moving on to learning about how farming and the River Nile were hugely important to their survival.





Year 4 and 5 are also looking at the Ancient Civilisations; Year 4 are studying the Romans and are finding out more about what made them such feared warriors, whilst Year 5 have been looking at the Mayans and the impact they had on the modern world.

Year 6 are about to start learning about the Windrush, including why the Windrush Generation came to Great Britain in the 1950's as well as learning about the struggles they faced upon their migration and the impact they made upon moving here.
