#### EYFS

We have been working hard in Year 4 over the last month!


Last week, the children visited the Science Curiosity Cube and had great fun carrying out a range of experiments linked to microbiomes.



## **<u>Reading Rocks!</u>**

In this week's newsletter we will be looking at which book your child is studying in their reading lesson, a synopsis about it and some key questions/ activities you could ask them. Building a love of reading starts with developing your own understanding of books, I hope this helps to construct meaningful conversations about literature.

EYFS	The Growing Story:
	The Growing Story by Ruth Krauss is a delightful book all about growing bodies
	linked to the seasons. A little boy, some chicks and a puppy live on a farm. They
	see the first signs of spring growing in the fields and the little boy asks his
	mother if he and the puppy will grow too.
	Key Question/ Activities:
	• What happens to us when we grow up?
	• What changes happened within the book?
	• Can you draw a picture of you as a baby and you now?
Year 1	Where the Wild Things are:
	Feeling misunderstood at home and at school, mischievous Max escapes to the
	land of the Wild Things (majestic and sometimes fierce creatures). They allow
	Max to become their leader, and he promises to create a kingdom where everyone will be happy. However, Max soon finds that being king is not easy
	and that, even being with the Wild Things, there is something missing.
	Key Questions/ Activities:
	• How do you think Max feels when his mother sends him to his room?
	<ul> <li>Do you think a forest really grew in Max's room? If not, what do you think really happened?</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Do you think the Wild Things are real? What's the difference between things that are real and things you dream about or imagine? What sort of things do you dream about?</li> </ul>
	• Do you have a favourite illustration?
Year 2	Mrs Nouh's Pockets:
	When Mr Noah decides to be quite selective about the animals he allows on his
	ark, Mrs Noah takes matters into her own hands. She sets to work on her
	sewing machine making a brand-new coat with lots of very deep pockets. Then
	before the ark sets sail, she goes for a walk in the woods collecting the mythical animals her husband plans to leave behind.
	Key Questions/ Activities:
	• Share favourite lines in the story and favourite illustrations
	<ul> <li>Talk about the decisions the characters made in the story – Mr Noah deciding to get rid of 'troublesome' creatures and Mrs Noah deciding to save them.</li> </ul>

	• What might Mr Noah say when he finds the creatures he tried to get rid of still exist? You pretend to be Mr Noah and Mrs Noah and have an imaginary conversation.
Year 3	<b>Pebble in my Pocket:</b> The story tells the dynamic tale of rock formation; showing the reader the processes that the pebble goes through from its beginnings in a fiery volcano 480 million years ago - how it is moulded by fire, then shaped by erosion.
	<ul> <li>Key Questions/ Activities:</li> <li>Draw your own diagram and show how each rock is formed and describe the differences.</li> </ul>
	• Create your own piece of artwork.
	• Look up different volcanos and write facts about them.
Year 4	The Boy at the Back of the Class: When a new boy joins their class, a group of children try to befriend him. They soon learn that Ahmet is a refugee and has been separated from his family. None of the grown-ups seem to be able to help him, so the friends come up with a daring plan, embarking on an extraordinary adventure.
	<ul> <li>Key Questions/ Activities:</li> <li>What is the best thing about starting a new term for you?</li> </ul>
	• Can we learn from our mistakes?
	• Make a poster about how to be a good friend.
Year 5	<b>Shackleton's Journey:</b> In August 1914, Ernest Shackleton and his brave crew set out to cross the frozen wastes of Antarctica, in what was to be the last expedition of the Heroic Age of Antarctic Exploration. Ahead of them lay unimaginable danger - ferocious seas, uncharted mountains, ice and snow.
	<ul> <li>Key Questions/ Activities:</li> <li>How would Shackleton raise his crews' spirits?</li> </ul>
	• Can you summarise what happens in less then 20 words?
	• Write a diary entry about how you might have felt on the expedition.
Year 6	<b>Rooftoppers:</b> Found floating in a cello case in the middle of the English Channel after a shipwreck on her first birthday, by eccentric young scholar Charles, Sophie seems to be marked out for an unconventional existence. Growing up in Charles's shabby home in England, she learns to love music and to read Shakespeare, but very little about how to be ladylike. On her twelfth birthday, the disapproving authorities intervene, but before they can take her away to an

	<ul> <li>orphanage, the discovery of a chance clue in her cello case makes Charles and Sophie decide to ignore their decrees, and instead run away to Paris in search of Sophie's long lost-mother, whatever the consequences may be.</li> <li>Key Questions/ Activities: <ul> <li>What has happened in the story so far?</li> <li>Can you predict how the story will finish?</li> <li>Research Paris and create an artistic piece that represents what you have found out.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
