CYBER SECURITY BUZZWORDS CHEAT SHEET



Do you know your phishing from your smishing? Or the difference between malvertising and malspam? Cyber security terms can be confusing so keep this cheat sheet handy to help build your cyber resilience.

Common Cyber Security Terms



Authentication

The process of identifying a user's identity, making sure that they can have permission to access a particular system and/or files.



Firewall

Any technology used to keep intruders out. This could be software or hardware that aims to block unwanted internet traffic.



This is when a hacker changes the IP address of an email so that it appears to come from a trusted source.



Spyware

A form of malware used by hackers with the aim of spying on you and capturing your computer activities.



Cyber resilience

Understanding when you are at risk online and having policies and procedures in place to mitigate against these threats



Hacker

Any person who attempts to gain unauthorized access to a system with the intent to cause mischief, damage, or theft



Trojan Horse

A malware that disguises itself as something innocent (e.g. an online game) but allows a hacker access to vour computer.

Ransomware terms

Reports of ransomware attacks have

more than doubled since 2020



Changes, corrupts, or destroys information and passes it to other systems. In some cases, a virus can cause physical damage to a device.

Phishing Terms

Phishing attacks are the most common form of cyber attack in the UK



Phishing

The use of 'real' or authentic looking messages and emails pretending to be someone or something else to gain access to your personal information and/or account details.

Vishing

The use of phone calls or voice

messages in phishing schemes.

Criminals can use voice over

technology to change or alter

their voice, appearing more

convincing to the victim.



Spear phishing

A highly targeted phishing attack. While both scams use email to reach their victim, spear phishing involves sending customised emails to a specific individual.



. Ransomware

Also known as ransom malware, is a type of malware that prevents users from accessing their system, account or personal files and demands a 'ransom' payment in order for them to regain access to their systems.



Whaling

Attacks targeted at a senior executive, and usually don't contain a link but are looking for a 'favour' from a more junior employee e.g. buying gift cards for staff members.



Smishing

Similar to Phishing this scam looks authentic and attempts to gain access to personal information but instead of an email it uses SMS text messages.



Malvertising

Also known as malicious advertising is the use of online advertising to distribute malware. This can take the form of pop up adverts. When clicked, a web page may be 'infected' and send the user's data to criminal servers.



Malspam

Also known as Malicious spam, may use the same tactics as phishing schemes, with one MAJOR difference - the link may lead to a malicious site with attachments which if clicked, will trigger malware to begin downloading.

Top Tips for Being Cyber Resilient



Do not click any suspicious links - this includes any from accounts you may know or recognise.



Remember to back up and update your device often



Don't enter or give your personal information, account details or card details on login sites you are sent to via links.

Always ignore accounts representing companies organisations or public figures who are not verified.

Hare Time

One animal that enjoys both solitude and spring is the brown hare. They can be seen, in late March and early April, sprinting after one another over the fields before standing upright on their long hind legs to take swipes at each other with their paws, as if they were humans having a boxing match.

This phenomenon gave rise to the phrase 'Mad as a March hare', which you may recognise from Alice in Wonderland. The mad hare is in fact a love-obsessed buck (male) who bounds after his beloved doe (female) and gets punched on the nose for his trouble. But these bouts are not as mad as they look. The does tend to be larger than the bucks and so by testing their suitors for strength and speed, they work out who will be a strong and healthy mate for them to start a family with.

About six weeks after they have mated, tiny leverets (baby hares) appear. Doe hares are unusual mammals in that they can become pregnant whilst *already* pregnant, a rare process known as superfetation. Once she has had her litter – typically around two leverets at a time – a doe will groom and feed her young for a few weeks, sometimes carrying

a leveret around in her mouth like a cat with a kitten, before leaving them to fend for themselves.

After that, hares tend to be solitary creatures. Unlike rabbits, who live in a warren of burrows together, hares have no home. They dig shallow ditches in the ground to sleep in, called forms, in which they spend much of the day before emerging to consume vast quantities of food at dusk.

Legend has it that a hare crossing your path is unlucky, but today you should count yourself extremely fortunate if you see one. Brown hares were brought to Britain during the Iron Age and although originally revered as godlike – the modern Easter Bunny derives from the hare-headed Anglo-Saxon goddess Eostre and her pet white hare-they have also long been hunted for food.

So they are not only wary of humans, but practised at fleeing from them. They can run twice as quickly as the fastest human on earth, thanks to their huge, powerful engine of a heart and long, muscular hind legs. Speed is not a hare's only defence: they also confuse their predators by 'jinking' – sudden, breakneck zigzagging turns.

Perhaps it was this combination of speed and craftiness which gave rise to the folk tales told all over these islands in which witches transform into 'witch-hares' at night, accused of stealing milk from cows and nibbling saplings in orchards, among other crimes.

Who can say, but there is certainly something magical about these elusive creatures who have been spotted at night, all arranged in a circle and cast in silhouette by the milky light of a full April 'hare-moon', lost in silent parliament with one another for reasons that are, as yet, beyond our comprehension.
