Applying for Free School Meals


If you think your child is eligible to benefit from this funding and to receive Free School Meals please apply directly via the Suffolk County Council website.

Your child will get free school meals if you receive any of the following:

- Income Support
- Income-based Job Seeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Guarantee element of State Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit but no element of Working Tax Credit and have an annual income (as assessed by HM Revenues & Customs) that does not exceed £16,190
- If you are supported under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Working Tax Credit during the four-week period immediately after your employment finishes or after you start to work fewer hours per week
- Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400 (£616.67 per month), as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods).

Sunny didn't win: another sunflower stole the prize by a centimetre. But no boy stood taller than Hal.




A very warm welcome back to Place Farm and to the Rainbow class. It has been so lovely to see all their beautiful faces back in our classroom again (and some new faces). The children have all settled in fantastically well and have coped brilliantly with the changes in their routines. What a driven bunch of pupils!

There are a few changes this year and the children have loved studying and learning in their new lessons. We have moved away from our project work, and focused back on individual subject lessons. So far the children have enjoyed Living things in Science, The Great Fire of London in History and Samba in Music, along with some computing sessions. Today we are delving into our Design and Technology lessons again and looking at patchwork, applique and sewing.





In Maths we are looking at Number and partitioning numbers into tens and ones, and becoming familiar with these, in order to create and solve calculations.



In Writing we have begun a unit which helps us to create strong sentences, thinking about structure, basic skills like full stops and capitals, and gets us to slow down and really focus on what we're writing. The children are doing so well with it!

We also have practiced these skills in handwriting, spelling and Sounds Write work, which we're loving.

In Reading we have been looking at the story of the Goose that laid a golden egg and thinking about greed and foolishness. The children have used inference to understand the story and it's moral deeper.

Attendance Matters

The Department for Education issued guidance to all schools in August 2022, "Central to raising standards in education and ensuring all pupils can fulfil their potential is an assumption so widely understood, that it is insufficiently stated - pupils need to attend school regularly to benefit from their education. Missing out on lessons leaves children vulnerable to falling behind. Children with poor attendance tend to achieve less in both primary and secondary school".

The whole school community - children, parents and carers, teaching and support staff, school governors and the Board of the Trust - have a responsibility for ensuring good school attendance.

Some key information from the Unity Schools Partnership Policy:

Please ensure that children arrive at school on time. School starts at 8.35. Children who arrive after the gates have closed must be signed by parents/carers in at the school reception.	Please notify school on the first day of absence by 9:30am by telephoning the school office, 01440 702836 or emailing <u>admin@placefarm.org.uk</u>
Please liaise with the school as soon as possible (by emailing admin@placefarm.org.uk regarding any specific issues that might cause absence or lateness, e.g., a sick parent/carer. Parents/carers of children for whom we do not know the reason for absence will be contacted.	Please ensure that as far as possible, medical appointments are arranged for outside school hours.
Children who repeatedly attend school late (30 minutes after the register opens) will be brought to the attention of the Education Welfare Officer. The Education Welfare Officer will undertake unannounced gate checks.	Parents/carers should note that children who arrive late after the register has closed are given a 'U' code, which is the equivalent of an unauthorised absence , and this will affect the child's attendance figures. Fixed penalty notices may be issued to parents/carers whose children persistently arrive after this time.
Regular monitoring is carried out by the Education Welfare Officer. Children who have repeated unauthorised absences, holidays or otherwise, will be contacted by the Education Welfare Officer and may be invited to an attendance meeting to discuss absences and any appropriate support. Leave of Absence Request Forms can be found on the Place Farm Primary Academy website. Parents/carers should be aware that it is the policy of all schools in this Trust not to approve term time holidays unless in exceptional circumstances. If parents/carers decide to take a holiday, the child's absences will be marked as unauthorised. A fixed penalty notice fine will be issued if 8 or more unauthorised absence sessions have occurred (4 whole
Completed forms should be returned to admin@placefarm.org.uk	days in total). Wherever possible, we will give a reminder (Letter 1) when unauthorised sessions reach 4 or more (2 whole days in total).
